

Ethical Understanding - Consumption and Production

INTRODUCTION

Students develop the general capability of ethical understanding as they identify and investigate the nature of ethical concepts, values and character traits, and understand how reasoning can assist ethical judgement. (Australian Curriculum General Capabilities-Ethical Understanding). The curriculum supports students to become responsible local and global members of the community in an interconnected world and to engage with complex ethical issues and concepts (Alice Springs (Mparntwe) Education Declaration, 2019, p15).

RATIONALE

The curriculum content for this short course focuses on what we ought to do and how we ought to live within the context of consumption and production. A basic foundation for ethical understanding is that human behavior has consequences for the welfare of others and for the environment. We can knowingly and unknowingly make decisions that increase or decrease the quality of others' lives and the environment. We are capable of helping or harming others and the environment.

Building ethical understanding within the context of consumption and production requires learners to engage with basic ethical concepts such as truth, fairness, justice, equality and respect. Learners will develop their ethical understanding as they explore these concepts and reflect on ethical principles underpinning consumption and production, especially those embodied in UN Sustainable Development Goal 12.

Engaging with complex ethical issues, understanding differing ethical perspectives and reflecting on personal values and actions in relation to consumption and production supports learners to behave ethically and to become active and informed local and global citizens.

- analyse behaviours that exemplify ethical concepts
- identify and describe different ethical positions and decisions from a personal, social and global perspective

- consider and reflect on how perceptions impact actions and consequences.

WORK REQUIREMENTS

A body of work within an ePortfolio which will include:

1. A Journal: Comprising ongoing responses and reflections from throughout the qualification. The type of journal (oral, written, multimodal) will be determined by the learner
2. Module Assessment Tasks:
Select one of the targets of SDG12 and provide 3- 5 ethically grounded reasons for personal action.
 - a. Select one of the water, energy or food dilemmas provided and identify possible actions and their consequences.

- b. Compose a series of tweets, from a personal, social and global perspective, taking a stance on an issue related to ethical consumerism.
- c. Ethical Donations Dilemma: Consider the three personal donation scenarios and decide which path you would take. Explain your reasoning for making this decision.
